Icelandic contribution to RAP: Lion's book project to promote reading of text with a history theme. The Lions, with funding from 42 clubs, are producing top-quality books and give them to 6-year olds who are about to start school! (Project in cooperation with the ministry.) On a separate bookmark, Lions promote their organisation and projects.

A next logical step would be reading hours for children.

US contribution by Michelle Anderson: Is involved in programmes for children and young people, and particularly in fund-raising. She has brought up the issue of new goals for the coming 100 years and feels that there is a need for a change of focus. More efforts have to be made with regard to education in general and reading/literature in particular.
